<p><b>Clean Water State Revolving Fund (CWSRF):</b> The CWSRF assists in the funding of wastewater treatment facilities and projects associated with estuary and nonpoint source programs. COPS Office funding provides training and technical assistance to advance community policing at all levels of law enforcement, from line officers to law enforcement executives, as well as others in the criminal justice field. <p><b>Internet Crimes Against Children:</b> ICAC Training and Technical Assistance Grants Program is to provide training to ICAC task forces and other Federal, state, and local law enforcement agencies in the areas of investigations, forensics, prosecution, community outreach, and capacity-building related to Internet crimes against children and technology facilitated child sexual exploitation using recognized experts to assist in the development and delivery of training programs.</p>	We will target training areas of Forensic Analyses for Computers and Other Devices and Specialized Techniques for Investigating Child Sexual Exploitation Offenses (e.g. cell phone technology or file encryption) in our proposal. Clean Cities began in 1994 and is a coalition of government agencies and private companies with an interest in developing and implementing alternative fuel technologies.
