***Beginning Fly Tying – March 12, 6:30-9:30 pm, \$45***

Class covers the basics of fly tying, starting with the tools and materials needed and how they are used. Learn about the four fly patterns, currently in use today: dry flies, nymphs, wet flies and streamers. Instruction provides the student with a basic understanding of materials and techniques needed to tie most basic fly patterns.
