<b>Neighborhood Stabilization Program:</b> Created with the Housing and Economic Recovery Act of 2008, the Neighborhood Stabilization Program provides emergency assistance to state and local governments to acquire and redevelop foreclosed properties that might otherwise become sources of abandonment and blight within their communities. The (NSP) provides grants to purchase foreclosed or abandoned homes and to rehabilitate, resell, or redevelop these homes in order to stabilize neighborhoods and stem the decline of house values of neighboring homes. Grant agreements being prepared for execution.	FY1 – this funding is not part of the 2009 Stimulus funding but rather funding extended when the Federal Government put in place its first stimulus package in September 2008. Council approved HCD’s application to the North Carolina Division of Community Assistance for a \$5.25 million dollar Neighborhood Sustainability Program (NSP) grant to fund a four point strategy to purchase foreclosed and abandoned homes and properties in priority areas. The City of High Point, Greensboro Housing Authority and Habitat for Humanity received approximately \$2 million each. An additional \$125,000 will be available for program administration expenses. We are working with statewide NSP grantees including North Carolina Housing Finance Agency and Self-Help Credit Union to create complementary programs for homebuyer assistance and acquisition/rehabilitation. We will have one year from June 1 to obligate all funds.

<b>Homelessness Prevention and Rapid Re-Housing Grant Fund:</b> For homelessness prevention and rapid re-housing activities. Specifically, the funds can be used for short-term or medium-term rental assistance, housing relocations, and stabilization services (including housing search, mediation, outreach to property owners, credit repair, security or utility deposits, utility payments, rental assistance for a final month at location, moving cost assistance, and case management) for homelessness prevention or re-housing to recently homeless.	Homelessness Prevention Program This funding will be used for financial assistance and services to prevent individuals and families from becoming homeless and to help those who are experiencing homelessness to be quickly re-housed and stabilized. The funds will provide for a variety of assistance, including short-term or medium-term rental assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services. Funds may be used for mediation, credit counseling, security or utility deposits, utility payments, moving cost assistance, and case management. Family Service of the Piedmont and Greensboro Housing Coalition will carry out the services for the first year.	\$781,141	Public Rev/CRB Recommendation/ Council Approval	City Council meeting May 5; Application to HUD on May 18; Application approved by HUD June 25. <b>Community Development Block Grant:</b> CDBG funds may be used to provide affordable housing, services, and jobs for the most vulnerable in our communities. Under the Recovery Act, recipients must give priority to projects that can award contracts within 120 days for projects that invest in economic development, housing, infrastructure and other public facilities that create or retain jobs. A public information session was held May 18th. The Community Resource Board reviewed proposals on May 21st and recommended 8 projects for funding, which City Council approved on June 2nd. Application submitted to HUD on June 5th.

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<b>Energy Efficiency and Conservation Block Grants:</b> For federal grants to units of local government, Indian tribes, and states to reduce energy use and fossil fuel emissions, and for improvements in energy efficiency. Eligible projects may achieve the following goals: reduction of fossil fuel emissions created as a result of activities within the jurisdictions of eligible entities, reduce total energy use, or improve energy efficiency in the transportation, building, and other sectors. 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<b>Highway Infrastructure Investment:</b> The highway infrastructure funding will be apportioned to states using existing formulas (50% STP State distribution formula and 50% according to the FFY 2008 Obligation Limitation) with 30% of the funds within each state being suballocated under the population formulas of the STP program (to Metropolitan Planning Organizations (MPOs)). Funds can be used for any project eligible under the surface transportation program, passenger and freight rail, and port infrastructure. Funds cannot be used for Advance Construction.
