<p>Clean Water State Revolving Fund (CWSRF): The CWSRF assists in the funding of wastewater treatment facilities and projects associated with estuary and nonpoint source programs. COPS Office funding provides training and technical assistance to advance community policing at all levels of law enforcement, from line officers to law enforcement executives, as well as others in the criminal justice field. Grants were last funded in 2004, and were awarded to state, local and tribal governments, health care providers, schools, libraries, police departments, and community-based nonprofit organizations. Clean Cities began in 1994 and is a coalition of government agencies and private companies with an interest in developing and implementing alternative fuel technologies. Clean Cities coalition members help applicants to win funding for alternative fuel projects.
