HOME Investment Partnership Program: HOME provides formula grants to States and localities that communities use, often in partnership with local nonprofit groups, to fund a wide range of activities that build, buy, and rehabilitate affordable housing for rent. This grant is restricted by the ARRA of 2009 to providing an additional amount for capital investments in low-income housing tax credit projects. Weatherization Assistance Grants: Provides funding towards low-income weatherization programs. Under the existing DOE weatherization program, weatherization services are cost-effective energy efficiency measures for existing residential and multi-family housing with low income residents. The program includes a wide variety of energy efficiency measures that encompass the building envelope, its heating and cooling systems, its electrical system, and electricity consuming appliances.	Weatherization Program	Unknown		North Carolina has received \$113 million to be provided over the next 3 years, \$10 million of which should flow to the Triad area. Regional Consolidated Services (RCS) in Asheboro is the non-profit agency that the State contracts with to run the weatherization program for the Triad. RCS expects to be able to weatherize more than 2,000 homes during the next three years. Right now RCS is preparing to implement this expanded program by buying additional equipment and hiring and training additional employees. 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Drinking Water Revolving Funds (DWSRF): The DWSRF provides low-interest loans (half market rate) to assist public water systems in achieving or maintaining compliance with the federal Safe Drinking Water Act (SDWA), including all environmental reviews and applicable permits. Projects must be from a public water system, must comply with the SDWA, and must be on the state program's project priority list, or Intended Use Plan.
