

# City Is Quiet On Counter Front

Greensboro, the first city to be hit by lunch counter demonstrations, remained quiet yesterday as the demonstrations spread to a sixth North Carolina city.

The lunch counters at local F. W. Woolworth and Kress stores remained closed for the third day.

The demonstrations, first staged by A&T College students on Feb. 1, spread to Durham, Charlotte, Winston-Salem, Fayetteville and Raleigh.

## Reaches Raleigh

Four stores in Raleigh were scenes of demonstrations yesterday.

Local Negro students called a two weeks truce in their campaign to obtain lunch counter service at the two variety stores.

Dr. George Simpkins, local NAACP president, said the NAACP still has not entered the campaign as an organization.

Gordon Carey, field secretary of the Congress on Racial Equality, was due to return to Greensboro last night. He was believed to be either in Charlotte, Durham or Winston-Salem.

Carey said in Greensboro Tuesday that plans are being made to picket Woolworth Stores in New York beginning Saturday.

Dr. Simpkins said he understands that Carey is going to Atlanta within the next several days to negotiate with Woolworth's officers there. Atlanta is district headquarters for the company.

Dr. Simpkins also said that it is his understanding that the stores in the Atlantic District would follow the policy dictated by their New York headquarters.
