

RESTAURANT SERVICE ASKED BY WHITE, NEGRO GROUP

CHAPEL HILL, March 2 (AP)—A group of about 50 Negroes and whites demanded service today at a Howard Johnson restaurant near Chapel Hill but left after being threatened with possible arrest.

The group was about equally divided between whites and Negroes. The building housing the restaurant is owned by Gov. Hodges and Sen. Everett Jordan but is leased to Harold Makepeace, the governor's private secretary, and three associates.

Makepeace said a "no trespass" sign was on display in the restaurant when the group entered about noon. He said he understood the whites were students from Duke and the University of North Carolina.

As the group left, one of the Negroes, a student at North Carolina College in Durham, said "we'll be back."
