

White Students Would Be Served, Manager Testifies

RALEIGH, March 29 (AP) — Two Negro college students would have been served at the lunch counter if they had been white, the manager of a chain variety store testified in Raleigh City Court Monday.

The two were among 43 students found guilty of trespass charges growing out of protests to segregated lunch counter service. Lawyers gave notice of appeal to Wake Superior Court.

Judge Albert Doub ordered fines of \$25 each and court costs for James A. Fox and Albert R. Sampson, arrested last week at the downtown McClellan Store.

Fines of \$10 each and court costs were ordered for the remaining 41, all arrested last month at Raleigh's Cameron Village Shopping Center. The sentences were the same imposed in the cases of two other students tried two weeks ago.

Claude M. Breeden, manager of the McClellan Store, was cross-examined closely during trial of Fox and Sampson.

Asked if Negroes were welcome to trade at every counter except where food is served, he replied, "That is correct."

Sampson and Fox said they made purchases in other parts of the store before going to the lunch counter. They said they considered this made them guests of the store.
