

Rehearing Opposed

A delay by the U.S. Supreme Court in issuing a mandate ordering five Greensboro Negroes to begin jail sentences on trespass charges will not be opposed by the office of the North Carolina attorney general.

However, the Negroes' petition for a new hearing before the U.S. Supreme Court will be opposed.

That was the word yesterday from Ralph Moody of Raleigh, assistant attorney general who represented the state before the high court after the five Negroes appealed their conviction from the State Supreme Court.

The five were appealing 15-day jail sentences imposed in Guilford Superior Court after they were found guilty of trespassing on Gillespie Park Golf Course, then owned by the City of Greensboro, now abandoned.
