SUBJECT: Gillespie Golf Course Improvements

In March of 2010, the City worked with the First Tee of the Triad and the Bryan Foundation to make some driving range and practice area improvements in an effort to grow youth golf and attract more adult golfers to Gillespie. Currently Gillespie golf course does not offer any introductory or advanced golf lessons. The First Tee program teaches introductory golf and life skills to youth, but does not program for adults.

The Parks and Recreation Department is again working with the Bryan Foundation to fund another significant improvement to the practice facilities at Gillespie in an effort to make adult lessons more attractive. The Bryan Foundation, Wyndham Championship and Greensboro Jaycees are willing to fund a covered teaching bay on the practice tees that will allow for year round instruction in a more controlled environment. This is instrumental in attracting a teaching professional that can provide an array of quality instructions. Secondly, the foundation will fund a short game area that will allow golfers to practice short range chipping of less than 30 yards. The cost to make the two improvements is estimated to be \$80,000.

The attached drawing illustrates what the short game area will look like. The department was already planning on planting grass and shrubs in this area to green it up. The City would be responsible for removing the existing gravel from the site and maintaining the improvements afterwards. The annual maintenance of the new short game area and teaching bay is expected to be \$3,000 and absorbed by the department's budget. The department expects that there will be increased revenues in range ball sales based upon these improvements. Range ball revenue from FY 09-10 to FY 10-11 went up over \$9,000 and this increase can be attributed to the improved practice facilities that opened in June 2010.

These improvements, along with a renewed focus on bringing in teaching professionals for instructions, will continue to raise the level of service available at Gillespie Golf Course with the hope of increasing play. City Council will be asked to approve the Bryan Foundation making these improvements at the January 17, 2012, meeting.



FY 2012-2013 Operating and Capital Budgets' Development

This session will provide Council with a current look at the City's financial situation and how that will impact the FY 2012-2013 budget. SUBJECT: City Council Ethics Training

North Carolina General Statute 160A-84 requires that each election cycle elected officials need to obtain two hours of ethics training within 12 months after initial election to office and within 12 months after each subsequent election to office. The North Carolina School of Government provides the required training in the Essentials of Municipal Government courses, of which a schedule is attached. Ethics training will also be provided at the annual League meeting held in October. I am looking into alternatives to possibly having an ethics webinar or ethics training in the immediate area and will provide an update when I know more.

My office can provide assistance in registering new and returning Councilmembers for the Essentials of Municipal Government Course if any member would like us to do so.

Please let me know if I can provide further assistance.

Two educational programs will be offered in five locations across the state to help newly elected and veteran officials lead in this time of change, respond innovatively to economic challenges, and work together effectively to make decisions that will shape North Carolina's future. Both programs offer participants points toward recognition in the [Local Elected Leaders Academy \(LELA\)](#). ^[3]

Ethics Training:

Each course below-*Essentials of Municipal Government* as well as *Community Planning and Zoning: Making Better Decisions* offer the state mandated ethics training as part of the course curriculum. *Registration is required. This updated training fulfills the ethics education requirement for local elected officials that is state mandated each time an official is elected or re-elected. If an official is on the November 2011 ballot and wins the initial election or re-election, two hours of ethics training is required prior to November 2012. Attorneys can claim two hours of general CLE credit.*

To attend ethics during this program, you must register for one of the below courses. Please visit the [ethics](#) ^[4] website for additional information on ethics legislation and future ethics training.

Course Descriptions and Locations:

Essentials of Municipal Government \$350

For newly-elected officials

This two day course is for newly elected municipal officials. It is also recommended for veteran municipal officials who have never attended *Essentials*. The course is intended for new mayors and council members. The program covers the basics of municipal government, making the transition from campaigning to governing, understanding roles, responsibilities and key elements of municipal law, working effectively as a board and with the city manager, meeting financial requirements, understanding environmental regulation, and planning for zoning and land use. This course satisfies the ethics requirement

Community Planning and Zoning: Making Better Decisions -\$175

For veteran elected officials

This is a one day workshop held on the first day of *Essentials* and is for veteran municipal and county officials. Today's elected officials are confronted with controversial and complicated decisions about land use and development. Learn more about your role in planning and zoning, navigating the zoning process, and working effectively with others to make better decisions. Today's decisions will affect North Carolina's future.

Elected officials are encouraged to invite their municipal and county managers to join them. This workshop is held in the same location and on the first day of *Essentials of Municipal Government*. This course satisfies the ethics requirement.

Combination of both courses—Essentials of Municipal Government and Community Planning and Zoning: Making Better Decisions - \$350

For municipal veteran elected officials

This two day combined course is open to *veteran municipal elected officials*. The first day, attend the workshop on community and planning. Then on day two, join newly elected municipal officials in sessions discussing working together in council-mayor/council-manager municipalities, personnel and operations, infrastructure and environment, and financial management. This option is also recommended for entire boards. It provides opportunities for team building and networking. On Monday, January 16, 2012, at 7:30 am, the Greensboro Human Relations Commission will host its annual Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Memorial Breakfast at the Koury Convention Center in Greensboro. The breakfast will feature award-winning Journalist and Author Patrice Gaines as its Keynote Speaker. Tickets are \$20 and no tickets will be sold at the door.

The author of the autobiography, "Laughing in the Dark: From Colored Girl to Woman of Color-- A Journey From Prison to Power," Ms. Gaines was a veteran newspaper reporter for 23 years, working as a reporter for The Washington Post for more than 16 years. While at the Post she wrote two books and won several prestigious awards for her journalism, including the National Black Journalists First-Place Award for Commentary. Additionally, Ms. Gaines was part of a reporting team that was a finalist for the Pulitzer Prize in Public Service and was a Journalism Fellow at the University of Michigan. Her work has appeared in numerous publications including Essence and the New York Times Magazine. In addition to writing for publication, Ms. Gaines' commentaries have been broadcast on National Public Radio's "All Things Considered" and "Blues & Notes."

SUBJECT: South Elm Street Redevelopment Project Status

Current Status

Over the last several months, three development teams and their respective proposals have been under consideration by the Redevelopment Commission to redevelop the South Elm Street site. At their annual meeting, held yesterday January 11, 2012, the Commission selected South Elm Development Group (SEDG) as the preferred developer for the project and directed staff to begin negotiation of terms for a sales/development agreement.

Councilwoman Nancy Hoffman attended the meeting as did four members of the Community Advisory Group: Dabney Sanders, Eric Robert, Sidney Gray, and Ben Rousch. Mr. Robert spoke to the Commission about how important it will be that the selected developer conducts a comprehensive market study before attempting to secure retail tenants. He referenced the difficulty that the central business district has had in attracting new sustainable retail. Mr. Gray spoke to the Commission about the importance of protecting the existing businesses on the north side of Lee Street. He suggested that the Commission hold back enough land along the south side of Lee to allow for widening of Lee Street in the future, so no land will need to be taken from property on the south. In response to Mr. Gray's suggestion, Mr. Rousch reminded the Commission how important it is that new development reflects the urban design principal of placing buildings close to the street.

Next Steps

North Carolina General Statute Section 160-269 defines the methods for sale of property that the Commission can use. The process required in this case is a negotiated sale with upset bid. City staff will work with SEDG and legal staff to come up with recommended terms and conditions to include in an "Offer to Purchase" the land.

The next Redevelopment Commission meeting is set for February 3rd at 3pm. At that meeting city staff and SEDG will present the recommended terms and conditions. If the Commission is satisfied, they will vote to accept the Offer to Purchase with those specific terms and conditions from this developer. If that occurs, the selected developer must deposit not less than 5% of the Offer with the Commission prior to public advertisement. A public advertisement of the Offer to Purchase will indicate that the Offer to Purchase will be accepted unless an upset bid is received within ten (10) days raising the bid by 10% of the first \$1000 and 5% thereafter and meeting the terms and conditions. In the event of an upset bid, the bid shall be advertised again until no further upset bids are received.

Barring a prolonged upset bid process, the final step in the selection process is scheduled to occur at the February 21st City Council meeting, when the Commission will ask Council to approve the sale of the property to South Elm Development Group. If they approve, a sales/development agreement will be finalized and the developer will get started.
