**SUBJECT:** Greensboro's AmeriCorps Partnerships

During the City Council work session on May 22, staff was requested to identify if any City departments had partnered with AmeriCorps. AmeriCorps which is a program under the Corporation for National and Community Service engages more than 80,000 men and women in intensive service each year through more than 15,000 nonprofits, schools, public agencies, and community and faith-based groups across the country. AmeriCorps members help communities tackle pressing problems while mobilizing millions of volunteers for the organizations they serve.

The Greensboro Public Library has partnered with AmeriCorps since 1996 at the Glenwood Branch Library. The AmeriCorps participants teach English language and literacy classes, assist adult learners in the English Language lab and shelve books in the multicultural section of the library. The AmeriCorps participants assist in providing other English language specific programs and services as well.

The Greensboro Fire Department has some indirect involvement with AmeriCorps. Guilford County Emergency Management helps provide training to AmeriCorps volunteers when they come to this area and the Fire department is a part of that effort. In addition, the department's strongest non-profit partner, the American Red Cross, utilizes AmeriCorps volunteers.

**SUBJECT:** Grimsley Pool and Pool Reductions

The Grimsley pool was closed on December 7, 2011, due to structural integrity concerns, and will remain closed as Sutton-Kennerly and Associates conducts further analysis. We will be able to determine the next steps for the pool when the findings become available.

The pool is primarily used by the Guilford County School system, private swim organizations and the general public. Staff is working with these groups to accommodate their needs through the Greensboro Aquatic Center and Smith High School pool. A list of all available swim facilities will be included in this week's IFYI.

With the Grimsley pool closure, staff estimates a savings of \$121,986 for Fiscal Year 2012-13. Staff also recommends that the Smith High School pool operate on a modified schedule for the summer months to achieve an additional savings. This savings can be re-allocated to support our outdoor pool operations and expand the learn-to-swim programs, extend operational hours and improve accessibility. A reduction in personnel has also been recommended for an additional savings of \$54,940.

The current closure of the Grimsley pool and proposed reductions will result in a total savings of \$176,926 for Fiscal Year 2012-13. Staff will continue to direct user groups to other local aquatic facilities until a determination can be made with regards to the Grimsley pool.

As discussed in my meeting with you and Interim City Manager Roth on Thursday, May 24, the Action Greensboro Operating Group is interested in supporting Council's economic development focus and your efforts to find the right tools to enhance economic development opportunities in Greensboro. The members are particularly interested in how downtown growth and improvements can help facilitate the Council's economic development goals.

Action Greensboro contacted Richard Flierl, principal with Cooper Carry's Center for Connective Architecture, and the author of a Greensboro Center City Master Plan in 2001. You may recall that the plan included a ball park, a center city park, a greenway, a concert hall, and much more. Mr. Flierl will be on the east coast later this month. Per our discussion, we would like to invite him to visit and consult with the City and Action Greensboro while in the area, addressing the following tasks as part of the visit:

**SUBJECT:** Four Seasons Post Office Branch

The United States Postal Service (USPS) is currently negotiating the lease for the Four Seasons Town Center Branch. At this time, there is not a plan to close due to a leasing dispute. However, if a leasing agreement cannot be reached, it is possible that the branch could be suspended.

In July 2011, the Postal Service announced that it would study the potential consolidation of more than 3,700 retail outlets across the country. Included in that study were approximately 600 postal station and branch offices, which are satellite facilities of larger Post Offices and are generally located in urban and suburban areas. The USPS Post Plan, which was announced on May 9, 2012, affects nearly 13,000 small low-traffic Post Offices largely located in rural areas. The Post Plan will preserve these smaller Post Offices but reduce their hours of window service. It would also guarantee greater community participation in determining the particular needs and preferences of a local area.

The May 9, 2012, announcement was focused on the needs of rural America. Postal stations and branches that were under consideration for potential consolidation are not a part of that proposal. As subsidiary facilities for nearby Post Offices, stations and branches are organized differently. That said, while they are not part of the plan for rural Post Offices, any proposals to close these facilities have been placed on hold and they will not close at this time. Going forward, the Postal Service will evaluate how best to incorporate them into long-term plans for effective and efficient retail service.

**SUBJECT:** Third Quarter Update for Hilco Fuel Surcharges

Hilco Transport, our contractor for the hauling of refuse from the transfer station to the Montgomery County landfill, charges a total cost per trailer that includes a base rate per trailer and a fuel surcharge. The fuel surcharge, which is calculated as a percentage addition to the base rate, varies and is based on the Department of Energy's Diesel Fuel Price Index for the Lower Atlantic.

Fuel Surcharge costs over the first three quarters of FY 11-12 are \$408,879. This is \$136,924, or 50%, higher than costs for the first three quarters of FY 10-11 at \$271,955. The average for the fuel price index for the same period of FY 11-12 is \$3.85. This is \$0.69, or 22%, higher than the average fuel price index over the same period last year at \$3.16.

Even with the surcharge increases, total hauling costs for the first three quarters of 11-12 are only 0.7% higher than the same period last year. Total costs for the first three quarters are \$2,196,900 compared to \$2,182,708 for the same period of FY 10-11. This is an increase of \$14,192, or 0.7%. Total loads for the period decreased slightly by 81 loads, a 1.2% decrease, compared to the same period of FY 10-11. During FY 10-11, Field Operations renegotiated the base rate per trailer which resulted in a 7% reduction which began May of 2011. This savings assisted with keeping the total hauling cost increase minimal even with the changes in the fuel surcharge.

Attached are copies of the Fuel Surcharge Chart incorporated in the contact with Hilco Transport for services. This outlines what the fuel surcharge percentage will be based on the Department of Energy's Diesel Fuel Price Index for the Lower Atlantic. The second attachment is a chart of Hilco fuel surcharges and other costs for the first three quarters of FY 10-11 and FY 11-12.

SUBJECT: Subsurface Exploration for Cone-Nealtown Connector  
-- *UPDATED Schedule*

*UPDATE: The current schedule is to begin clearing for the work approximately July 16. Permit applications will be submitted on June 11, and NCDENR approval is anticipated within 30 days. The project was postponed three months during discussions of funding for the construction of the connector. A memorandum was published as an IFYI on March 16, 2012, with the following:*

In approximately six weeks, ECS Carolinas will begin performing an evaluation of the subsurface conditions at the Cone-Nealtown Connector. The Nealtown Road extension north of White Street requires a bridge over the North Buffalo Creek, approximately 1,000 feet north of White Street.

Excavation for the Nealtown Road extension and bridge approach will extend to a depth of 15 to 20 feet. It will extend approximately 750 feet from a point 200 feet north of White Street all the way to the creek. Much of this excavation will be in an old, unused landfill that pre-dates the current White Street landfill built to the east of this site. Subsurface investigations were performed in April 2005 to determine the extent of the landfill material near the creek and in August 2005 to determine the conditions under the proposed roadway. No obvious environmental problems with the landfill materials were identified at that time.

Prior to completing all the permitting of the roadway and bridge and letting of the contract, Engineering has requested addition testing to verify that there are no concealed environmental issues. These issues can cause delays and additional expenses if they result in unexpected soil remediation. The subsurface exploration and evaluation that will be provided by ECS Carolinas will require some heavy equipment on the site, primarily augers and boring equipment. The site is heavily wooded with no residences nearby.

The Engineering staff and the roadway and bridge consultant, STV/Ralph Whitehead Associates, will be monitoring the work at the site as needed. Due to the location of the work near the White Street landfill and the concerns of the neighborhood about construction in this area, Engineering staff will be prepared to answer inquiries about the nature and purpose of this work.
