**SUBJECT:** Lawndale Drive Corridor Study Update / Development Standards  
for Residential Lot Widths and Setbacks

Lawndale Drive is a thriving corridor that will have increased traffic and activity from projects such as the expansion of the Greensboro Science Center and the building of the urban loop. To better encourage continued quality growth along the corridor and protect adjacent neighborhoods, City Council has directed Planning and Community Development (PCD) to lead two processes: a study of the Lawndale Drive corridor and a study of residential development standards for lot widths and set-backs in adjacent neighborhoods that could have applications across the City.

#### **Lawndale Drive Corridor Study**

At the April 2, 2013 meeting City Council directed PCD staff to develop a scope of study for Lawndale Drive, encompassing the area from West Cornwallis Drive to the future interchange with the Urban Loop in the area of Cotswold Avenue. Opportunities for public involvement will be available for the businesses and institutions along the corridor as well as for residents of adjacent neighborhoods. A map of the proposed study area is attached.

The primary objectives of the corridor study is the development of a shared vision for the future character of the corridor and the creation of tools and strategies that support stability in adjacent neighborhoods while accommodating quality growth along the Lawndale Drive corridor.

As requested, staff has developed a phased scope of study that breaks the 3.6 mile corridor into three activity centers for in-depth analysis and direct engagement of area stakeholders.

III	Lawndale Homes/Lawndale North Activity Center (Cone Boulevard to Pisgah Church Road)
IV	Battleground Parks District Activity Center (Pisgah Church Road to Regents Park Lane)
V	Summary and prioritization of recommendations

Staff will complete the work in 18 to 22 months and has begun the data collection phase. Staff will incorporate the recommendations of the lot width and setback analysis detailed in the next section into the corridor study.

#### **Adjustments to Dimensional Standards**


One role of zoning is to provide a framework so that new development is compatible with and beneficial to existing neighborhoods. To this end City Council has asked staff to evaluate the City's development standards for residential lot widths and building setbacks in comparison with the development patterns already existing in older neighborhoods. Staff will use the results of the process to recommend changes to the Land Development Ordinance that will help new development blend in harmoniously with existing neighborhoods.

PCD will work with stakeholders to guide the process and inform staff's recommendations, and will give City Council bi-monthly updates on progress. Staff would like to receive from City Council the names of prospective members of this stakeholder group. The schedule for the proposed process is attached.


**Attachment A. Draft Corridor Study Area**

**SUBJECT:** GFD Accomplishment – EMS Continuing Education

The Greensboro Fire Department recently achieved credentialing as a Basic Educational Institution through the North Carolina Office of Emergency Medical Services. This credential allows our department to use our internal firefighters to provide Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) training to our employees. The credentialing process took over two years of work to accomplish. However, it now enables our department to provide initial, refresher and continuing education training to best enable our personnel to serve our citizens in accordance with state and national standards.

One of the key challenges that the Greensboro Fire Department embarked upon several years ago was to ensure that our firefighters were proficiently trained to best handle the first responder medical emergencies where they were called to serve. To further advance the medical training of the men and women of the department, we prioritized education for all certified EMTs using a best practices model.

Our department is working closely with the Guilford County Emergency Medical Services Training Division (GCEMSTD) in developing the training programs being delivered. The GCEMSTD also assisted our department in completing the requirements to become a credentialed teaching institution including providing the services of their Medical Director and his staff. Interim Guilford County Emergency Services Director Jim Albright and his staff have been very supportive throughout this entire process and without their commitment, this achievement would not yet have occurred.

I am proud of the work and dedication of the members of the Greensboro Fire Department for achieving this credential, but more importantly, this achievement demonstrates that our folks are always striving for continuous improvement to serve the people of Greensboro.

**SUBJECT:** Illegal Sign Removal in City Rights-of-Way

**Sign Removal in City Rights-of-Way (Multi-Department Pilot Effort)**

The City of Greensboro regulates signage as a means to limit potential hazards to pedestrian and vehicular traffic and preserve property values by preventing unsightly and cluttered development, while providing adequate business identification and advertising opportunities. Planning and Community Development initiated a multi-department pilot effort to examine ways to more effectively address continuing concerns regarding illegal signs in City rights-of-ways. This pilot effort focused on the removal of illegal portable signs (signs not attached to the ground or a structure that is not readily movable) and illegal signs attached to utility poles in public rights-of-way along the City's major transportation corridors, including:

Portable signs and signs attached to roadside appurtenances (including utility poles) are prohibited throughout the City via the provisions of Section 30-14-4 of the Land Development Ordinance (LDO) and subject to confiscation and disposal.

**Results from Multi-Department Sign Removal Pilot Effort**

Staff from the Field Operations, Water Resources and Transportation departments coordinated with Planning and Community Development staff on removing illegal signs in public rights-of-way along these corridors beginning the week of March 18, 2013. From March 18 to April 25 (approximately 6 weeks) a total of 1,757 illegal signs were removed from these corridors. Departments utilized a combination of light duty personnel and field crews to remove illegal signs while addressing other primary tasks from their respective departments. To date Planning and Community Development has received generally positive feedback on this pilot effort and staff is currently evaluating how these sign removal efforts have impacted other City operations to determine how this effort might best continue in the future.

***Piedmont Natural Gas Conducting Line Cleanout Friday through Sunday***

GREENSBORO, NC (April 26, 2013) – Piedmont Natural Gas is conducting a routine pipeline inspection April 29 through May 3 on property the company owns at 1906 White St. According to Piedmont Natural Gas, the maintenance is part of its Transmission Integrity Management Program and is required by the Federal Department of Transportation to ensure the safe and efficient delivery of natural gas to customers.

The company indicates that during the inspection process it may be necessary to conduct a controlled burn or “flaring” of any excess natural gas. The result could be a “flare stack,” which would produce a loud noise and a flame highly visible to nearby neighborhoods and businesses. The flare stack operation will be managed and monitored by Piedmont Natural Gas personnel in cooperation with the Greensboro Fire Department.

As a precautionary measure, Piedmont has contracted with the Greensboro Fire Department to provide a standby team of off-duty personnel for emergency services, if needed.

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The City works with the community to improve the quality of life for residents through inclusion, diversity, and trust. As the seventh largest employer in Greensboro, the City has a professional staff of about 3,000 employees who maintain the values of honesty, integrity, stewardship, and respect. The City is governed by a council-manager form of government with a mayor and eight council members. **SUBJECT: General Assembly Update**

During this session, over 1700 bills were introduced before the General Assembly's filing deadline. The next major deadline will be the May 16, 2013 crossover deadline. This deadline requires any bill to pass either the House or Senate before that date or the bill can no longer be considered this session. 177 House Bills and 107 Senate bills have "crossed over" at this time.

This update is intended to supplement the April 12, 2013 update. It will touch on only the "current topics", and is not intended to be a complete listing of all pertinent bills.

### **Local Legislative Agenda**

*1. Jordan Lake.*

City staff, TREBIC and our partner city Burlington met personally with DENR staff on two occasions to discuss the current version of SB 515, Nutrient Management Standards Reform Act. It is anticipated this bill will be heard in the Senate Committee on Agriculture/Environment/Natural Resources around the first of May. The City is now considering appropriate revisions to the Senate Bill in light of the discussions with DENR and our partners on this bill.

*2. Electronic Notice.*

Senate Bill 287, Notice Publication by Some Local Governments, began as a local bill for Greensboro, High Point and Guilford County. It has now expanded to 14 counties including Davidson, Forsyth, Randolph, Mecklenburg, and Wake. It passed the Senate on April 22<sup>nd</sup> by a vote of 26 to 22. It now resides in the House.

*3. MWBE/SBE & Revisions to City Charter Section 5.65 and 5.74.*

HB 524, Greensboro Charter Amendments, passed the House unanimously on April 25<sup>th</sup>.

*4. Greensboro Firemen's Supplemental Retirement System Local Act Amendment.*

HB 347, Amend Greensboro Firefighter's Retirement, was received favorably in the House Committee on Government, referred and received favorably in the House Committee on State Personnel and is now pending in the House Finance Committee.

5. *Prohibition of Brown Bagging at Sexually Oriented Businesses.*

SB 470, No Beer/Wine if Permit Revoked or Suspended, passed the Senate on April 11<sup>th</sup> by a vote of 46 to 0. It is now before the House Committee on Commerce and Job Development, the Subcommittee on Alcoholic Beverage Control.

6. *Breast Density Awareness.*

House Bill 467, Breast Density Notification and Awareness, passed the House on April 11<sup>th</sup> by a vote of 112 to 0. This bill now is before the Senate Committee on Health.

**Pertinent Legislation of Local Interest.**

1. HB 708, Enterprise Fund Revenue and Transfer Restrictions.

This bill as originally introduced would require all local government enterprise fund revenues to be used only for the purpose of paying the costs of operation and making debt service payments. The problematic wording of the bill could have restricted financing bonds currently used by the City of Greensboro Department of Water Resources. It may have limited cash reserves held for unforeseen events and would likely prevent the use of Water Resources' revenues for economic development. The City and the League of Municipalities opposed this bill and the sponsor agreed to convert this into a "study bill". This means the bill will survive until next year's short session and may be introduced again. However, the bill now appears on the calendar of the House Finance Committee for its April 30 meeting. We will work to determine if anything has changed.

2. HB 664, Cell Tower Deployment Act.

This bill will restrict the authority of municipalities to regulate cell towers in excess of Federal mandates. It will restrict regulations on substantial expansions of existing towers and placement of cellular communication equipment on existing building, water towers and other structures. It is now pending before the House Committee on Public Utilities and Energy.

3. HB 659, County and City Ethics.

This bill will expand disclosure requirements for City and County officials. It will require these officials to file the same annual financial disclosures that are filed by State elected officials. This bill is before the House Appropriations Committee.

4. HB 962, Municipal Sales Taxes.

If enacted, this bill would allow municipalities to adopt a .5 cent sales tax within their borders to fund beach nourishment, street and sidewalk construction and police, fire and rescue services for public events. This bill is before the House Committee on Rules, Calendar, and Operations.

5. HB 773, Local Government's/Buildings/Structures/Inspections.

We summarized this bill on April 12<sup>th</sup>. This would prevent local governments from charging fees to defray costs of a residential property registration program. It eliminates periodic inspections of repeat violators. The proposed law also defines what a "verified violation" is under the law. The first hearing before the House Government Committee was delayed last week and heard on April 25<sup>th</sup>. Mike Williams, Associate General Counsel, spoke with Representative Hardister, one

of the sponsors of this bill, to express the City's concerns regarding these additional limitations on regulations of rental housing.

6. HB 976, Gun Safety Act.

Representative Harrison and Representative Adams are among the sponsors of this bill. It seeks to repeal the "stand your ground" law enacted last session, requires background checks for private sales, gives SBI authority over background checks, requires firearm liability insurance for all gun purchasers, and bans large capacity magazines.

7. HB 937, Amend Various Firearms Laws.

Representative Faircloth and Representative Blust have sponsored this bill along with 26 other members of the House. It modifies several existing concealed carry gun laws. It redefines the term "recreational facility" and restricts the ability of Municipalities to regulate concealed weapons in some areas. The term "recreational facility" is clarified to no longer apply to playgrounds, greenways, bike or walking paths, or open areas or fields which are not "athletic fields". Concealed carry prohibitions at athletic fields will only apply if the field is scheduled for use. These revisions will require a substantial rewrite of Section 18-24 of the Greensboro City Code adopted March 21, 2012.

The bill would allow concealed weapons in restaurants where alcohol is served unless specifically banned by the restaurant. It will also allow persons with a concealed carry permit to carry a firearm in a closed container in their locked vehicle while parked on State owned or leased property.

8. SB 264, Abate Nuisances/Drug Sales From Stores.

This bill will significantly expand the reach of Chapter 19, Nuisances, and corrects a troublesome Court of Appeals' ruling. This bill removes the requirement that the legal activity sought to be abated must constitute the "sole" purpose of the location.
