Arlington Park Residents Update

Attached is an update on the concerns from Arlington Park residents and members of the neighborhood association. If you have any questions regarding this update, please contact Interim Director of Housing and Community Development Dan Curry at (336) 373-2349.

Removal of Post and Cables at 4701 Holders Road

Staff from the Planning Department visited 4701 Holders Road near Cove Creek Gardens in November 2009 to explore the removal of posts and cables along the property, and no zoning violations were found. The Engineering & Inspection Department also visited the site and found no Local Ordinance Enforcement violations. The posts and cables at this site block entry to the vacant property. While the posts and cable may not be particularly attractive, it doesn't appear that they violate any known City ordinances.

Maintenance Facility at Barber Park and Gateway Gardens

The Joint Maintenance Facility funding was included in the 2008 bond for phase two of the Barber Park Master Plan. With City Council's recent acceleration of bonds, this project will be moving forward as part of the overall construction and improvements to the Barber Park and Gateway Gardens Facilities. Design work for the building has already been completed. The Parks and Recreation Department is working with the Engineering and Inspection Department to move forward with construction. Parks and Recreation Department has requested additional design work for the community building component of phase 2 construction for Barber Park. After the additional design process, all of phase 2 (including the maintenance facility) will be bid out for construction.

History of the Jonesboro/Scott Park Neighborhood

Public Affairs Department has learned the Greensboro Historical Museum is preparing a similarly focused presentation. Channel 13 will partner with the Museum to create a video production using the Museum's research, pictures, etc. This work is in progress. The Museum's expertise in research, finding old pictures and documents will be tremendously helpful.

State Ethics Training and Conflict of Interest Reporting

The 2009 session of the North Carolina General Assembly (NCGA) enacted legislation requiring that governing boards of cities and counties, local boards of education, unified governments, sanitary districts and consolidated city-counties adopt a resolution or policy containing a code of ethics and receive two hours of ethics training by December 31, 2010. The NCLM is currently drafting a sample ordinance for cities that the City Attorney will evaluate and bring to Council for its consideration. Attached is a list of upcoming training sessions being offered for your convenience. Please notify the Clerk of which session Council plans to attend by Monday, January 25, 2010.

At the October 20, 2009 Council Meeting, City Attorney Terry Wood was asked to amend "Resolution in support of City Council members being subject to the State ethics and conflict of interest reporting forms." Council recently adopted an ethics reporting form (see attachment) for Council to use. Council is requested to submit this form to the Clerk if you had not already done so. The Legal Department can request that the NCGA consider a more extensive reporting requirement on the draft Legislative Agenda, if Council desire.

Citizen Review Committee Recommendations for Ordinance Changes

Citizen Review Committee recommendations will require legislative action and will be on the draft legislative agenda to be presented to Council for their consideration.

Vandalized Stop Signs Along Michaux Road

Signs were replaced on November 13, 2009.

Street Lights for Replacement

A Transportation Department Intern is currently riding the major thoroughfares and identifying street light outages. The Transportation Department staff has met with Duke Energy and discussed repair strategies. Duke will dedicate a crew to repair the outages at night so as not to create traffic issues with closing a lane of traffic along the major thoroughfares to fix the lights. Enforcement of Cars Parked in Designated Bike Lanes.

The Transportation Department notified the Police Department about the ordinance (see below) against parking in actual bike lanes and asked that the police enforce this ordinance as needed.

Some streets are marked with a wide edge line that is not an official bike lane where parking is allowed. Signed bike lanes are located on Willoughby, Westridge, Florida, Spring Garden and MLK. Edge-line markings are in place on other streets which are not signed or marked and do not therefore prohibit parking.

Ordinance Sec. 16-228. Bicycle-street lanes.

The street or portions of streets designated in traffic schedule no. 11 are established as bicycle-street lanes for the use of non-motorized bicycles requiring manual operation. When official traffic signs are in place designating a bicycle-street lane, it shall be unlawful for any person to park, drive, or enter any vehicle (except a bicycle as defined above) within a bicycle-street lane as designated by traffic schedule no. 11. (Code 1961, § 12-93)

Lake Townsend Raw Water Intake and Pumping Station Awards

The Environmental Business Journal selected the Lake Townsend Raw Water Intake and Pumping Station project for its 2009 Business Achievement Award. This project also recently won two Grand Awards from the American Council of Engineering Companies of North Carolina. The Lake Townsend project involves an unprecedented design that cut \$15m in construction costs and reduced energy consumption by 28 percent while maintaining 30 million gallons per day flow capacity for the City of Greensboro.

Arlington Park residents and members of the neighborhood association have expressed concerns about a variety of issues in their neighborhood. Mr. Russell Barrett and Ms. Mary Elizabeth Black of the Arlington Park Neighborhood Association (APNA) met with HCD staff several times to review and discuss these issues, which have been addressed as follows:

The 2-hour course will satisfy G.S. 160A-84, which requires elected officials of all North Carolina cities, counties, local boards of education, unified governments, sanitary districts, and consolidated city-counties to receive a minimum of two clock hours of ethics education. The training will be conducted by James Blackburn, Legislative Counsel for the North Carolina Association of County Commissioners. The registration fee is \$10 per attendee and includes a continental breakfast, materials, and a certificate of completion. Registration deadline is **Feb. 5, 2010** and seating is limited to the first 140 registrants.

RESOLUTION TO DELINEATE AND CLARIFY ETHICAL RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF GREENSBORO

WHEREAS, to protect the integrity of governmental decisions and to promote public confidence with respect to the impartiality and the fairness of those decisions, it is deemed in the best interest of the City to establish minimum standards that the Mayor and members of the City Council shall follow to avoid conflicts of interest, or the appearance thereof, in governmental decision-making.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GREENSBORO:

Section 1. Declaration of Policy. The proper operation of municipal government requires that members of the governing body be honest, impartial, fair, and responsible to the citizens; that governmental decisions and policies be made in proper channels of the governmental structure; that public office not be used for personal gain; and that the public have confidence in the integrity of its local government.

In recognition of these goals, the following minimum guidelines for ethical standards of conduct for members of the governing body are hereby established and approved and also clarified with respect to the responsibilities of said governing body with respect to conflicts of interest.

Section 2. Disclosure of Interest in Legislative Action. The Mayor or any member of the City Council who has a financial interest, direct or indirect, in any official act or action before the Council shall, prior to placing on the Council agenda, disclose such interest and all material facts with respect thereto to the City Manager and City Attorney. In addition, he/she shall publicly disclose on the record of the Council the nature and extent of such interest, including the full disclosure of all such material facts, and shall withdraw from any consideration of the matter, pursuant to Sec. 4.131 of the City Charter.

Section 3. Interest in Real Property. All transactions involving an interest in real property (whether for acquisition or sale) in which the Mayor or any member of the City Council has an interest therein, he/she shall inform the City Manager and City Attorney of such interest. Any real property transactions shall be handled exclusively through the office of the City Manager who shall garner all of the material facts and disclose such facts on the official record when the matter comes before the City Council.

Section 4. Orientation. That new members of the City Council shall undergo an orientation program and, with respect to legal matters, the City Attorney shall inform new members of the City Council of his/her ethical responsibilities under this policy as well as any other laws which may affect their ethical conduct with respect to conflicts of interest.

GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF NORTH CAROLINA

SESSION LAW 2009-403
HOUSE BILL 1452

AN ACT TO REQUIRE ALL CITIES, COUNTIES, LOCAL BOARDS OF EDUCATION, UNIFIED GOVERNMENTS, SANITARY DISTRICTS, AND CONSOLIDATED CITY-COUNTIES TO ADOPT A CODE OF ETHICS FOR THE GOVERNING BOARD AND TO REQUIRE THE MEMBERS OF THOSE GOVERNING BOARDS TO RECEIVE EDUCATION ON ETHICS LAWS APPLICABLE TO LOCAL GOVERNMENT OFFICIALS.

The General Assembly of North Carolina enacts:

SECTION 1. Article 5 of Chapter 160A of the General Statutes is amended by adding a new Part to read:

"Part 3A. Ethics Codes and Education Programs.

"§ 160A-83. Local governing boards' code of ethics.

(a) Governing boards of cities, counties, local boards of education, unified governments, sanitary districts, and consolidated city-counties shall adopt a resolution or policy containing a code of ethics to guide actions by the governing board members in the performance of the member's official duties as a member of that governing board.

(b) The resolution or policy required by subsection (a) of this section shall address at least all of the following:

- (1) The need to obey all applicable laws regarding official actions taken as a board member.
- (2) The need to uphold the integrity and independence of the board member's office.
- (3) The need to avoid impropriety in the exercise of the board member's official duties.
- (4) The need to faithfully perform the duties of the office.
- (5) The need to conduct the affairs of the governing board in an open and public manner, including complying with all applicable laws governing open meetings and public records.

"§ 160A-84. Ethics education program required.

(a) All members of governing boards of cities, counties, local boards of education, unified governments, sanitary districts, and consolidated city-counties shall receive a minimum of two clock hours of ethics education within 12 months after initial election or appointment to the office and again within 12 months after each subsequent election or appointment to the office.

(b) The ethics education shall cover laws and principles that govern conflicts of interest and ethical standards of conduct at the local government level.

(c) The ethics education may be provided by the North Carolina League of Municipalities, North Carolina Association of County Commissioners, North Carolina School Boards Association, the School of Government at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, or other qualified sources at the choice of the governing board.

(d) The clerk to the governing board shall maintain a record verifying receipt of the ethics education by each member of the governing board."

SECTION 2. G.S. 115C-47 is amended by adding a new subdivision to read:

"(57) To adopt a code of ethics. – Local boards of education shall adopt a resolution or

policy containing a code of ethics, as required by G.S. 160A-83."

SECTION 3. G.S. 115C-50 reads as rewritten:

"§ 115C-50. Training of board members.

(a) All members of local boards of ~~education~~ education, whether elected or appointed, shall receive a minimum of 12 clock hours of training annually. The 12 clock hours of training may include the ethics education required by G.S. 160A-84.

(b) The training shall include but not be limited to public school law, public school finance, and duties and responsibilities of local boards of education.

(c) The training may be provided by the North Carolina School Boards Association, the School of Government at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, or other qualified sources at the choice of the local board of education."

SECTION 4. Article 4 of Chapter 153A of the General Statutes is amended by adding a new section to read:

"§ 153A-53. Ethics.

(a) The board of commissioners shall adopt a resolution or policy containing a code of ethics, as required by G.S. 160A-83.

(b) All members of the board of commissioners, whether elected or appointed, shall receive the ethics education required by G.S. 160A-84."

SECTION 5. Article 1A of Chapter 160B of the General Statutes is amended by adding a new section to read:

"§ 160B-2.3. Ethics.

(a) The governing board shall adopt a resolution or policy containing a code of ethics, as required by G.S. 160A-83.

(b) All members of the governing board, whether elected or appointed, shall receive the ethics education required by G.S. 160A-84."

SECTION 6. Part 2 of Article 2 of Chapter 130A of the General Statutes is amended by adding a new section to read:

"§ 130A-49.5. Ethics.

(a) The governing board shall adopt a resolution or policy containing a code of ethics, as required by G.S. 160A-83.

(b) All members of the governing board, whether elected or appointed, shall receive the ethics education required by G.S. 160A-84."

SECTION 7. The resolution or policy containing a code of ethics that is required by G.S. 160A-83 shall be adopted by each municipality, county, local board of education, unified government, sanitary district, and consolidated city-county on or before January 1, 2011. The governing board may look to model local government codes of ethics for guidance in developing the resolution or policy.

SECTION 8. Except as otherwise provided in this act, this act becomes effective January 1, 2010. All members of governing boards covered by this act shall receive their initial training to comply with G.S. 160A-84 within 12 months after that date.

In the General Assembly read three times and ratified this the 28th day of July, 2009.

RESOLUTION REQUIRING PERSONS ELECTED TO THE GREENSBORO CITY
COUNCIL TO ANNUALLY FILE FINANCIAL AND PERSONAL INTEREST
DISCLOSURE FORMS AS REQUIRED BY PERSONS COVERED BY THE STATE
GOVERNMENT ETHICS ACT –CHAPTER 138A

WHEREAS, on July 28, 2009, the General Assembly enacted HB 1452 requiring all cities to adopt a code of ethics and that all elected officials complete at least two hours of training within 12 months of being elected or appointed;

WHEREAS, on July 18, 2008, the General Assembly enacted HB 2542 requiring State candidates for elective office and other covered persons to annually file a statement of economic interest with the State Government Ethics Commission as set forth in Attachment 1;

WHEREAS, HB 2542 is intended to require covered persons to disclose those personal and financial interests that could be or cause a conflict of interest or potential conflict of interest between the covered person's private interests and the covered person's public duties;

WHEREAS, the Mayor and members of the City Council recognize that it is important for the citizens of Greensboro to know that when they act the decisions and policies are not made for personal gain, in order that the public will have confidence in the integrity of its local government;

WHEREAS, the reporting requirements for local officials are not as stringent as the requirements for State officials;

WHEREAS, Greensboro's elected officials may adopt a Resolution imposing upon themselves to voluntarily disclose certain financial and personal interests in addition to those required of all other local officials and to make such disclosures a public record;

WHEREAS, to better protect the integrity of local governmental decisions, and to promote public confidence with respect to the impartiality and the fairness of those decisions, it is deemed in the best interest of the City of Greensboro to impose this additional obligation upon the Mayor and each member of the City Council to annually file the additional written financial and personal disclosure statement with the City Clerk.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GREENSBORO:

Within forty-five (45) days of taking office, and on or before December 31 annually thereafter, every person elected or appointed to City Council shall file a written Disclosure of Property Interest with the City Clerk. The Disclosure of Property Interest shall be on a form substantially similar to the form completed by members of the Guilford County Board of Commissioners to be provided by the City Manager and shall be a public record.
