IMPACT ANALYSIS

Land Use Compatibility

The proposed **R-5 (Residential, Single-Family – 5 du/ac)** zoning would allow land uses that are compatible with the general character of the area.

Connections 2025 Comprehensive Plan Policies

The Generalized Future Land Use Map designates this location as **Low Residential (3-5 d.u./acre)**. The requested **R-5 (Residential, Single-Family – 5 du/ac)** zoning is generally consistent with the **Low Residential (3-5 d.u./acre)** Future Land Use designation.

Connections 2025 Written Policies

Land Use Goal 4.1 – Growth Strategy: Promote sound investment in Greensboro's urban areas, including Center City, commercial and industrial areas, and neighborhoods.

Policy 4A: Remove present impediments to infill and investment in urban areas.

Low Residential (3-5 d.u./acre): This category includes the City's predominantly single-family neighborhoods as well as other compatible housing types that can be accommodated within this density range. Although there are some existing residential areas in the City developed on lots greater than 1/3 acre, future residential developments and "conventional" subdivisions should generally maintain a gross density of no less than three dwellings per acre, except where environmental constraints (e.g., the Watershed Critical Area) prevent such densities from being achieved. Compact developments that include clustered, small lots with substantial retained open space are encouraged.

STAFF ANALYSIS AND RECOMMENDATION

Community Outreach

Applicant is strongly encouraged to discuss this proposed rezoning and development with owners of surrounding properties.

Staff Analysis

This 4.694-acre subject site is currently a combination of a single family dwelling and undeveloped property. North and west of the request are single family dwellings (zoned R-3). East and south of the request is a combination of undeveloped property and single family dwellings (zoned R-5).

The Comprehensive Plan's future land use map designates this area as Low Residential. The Low Residential category includes the City's predominantly single-family neighborhoods as well as other compatible housing types that can be accommodated within a density range of 3 to 5 dwelling units per gross acre.

The request is compatible with adjacent residential development and supports the Comprehensive Plan's Housing and Neighborhoods goal to meet the needs of present and future Greensboro citizens for a choice of decent, affordable housing in stable, livable neighborhoods that offer security, quality of life, and the necessary array of services and facilities.

This request is consistent with the intent and purpose of the zoning code, the Comprehensive Plan (Connections 2025) and is generally compatible with the existing development and trend in the surrounding area.

Staff Recommendation

Staff recommends **approval** of the requested **R-5** (Residential Single-Family) zoning district.
